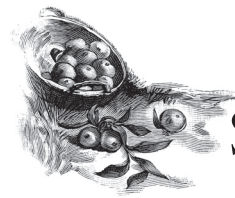

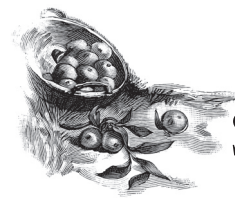
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**ORDINARY WOLVES**, by **Seth Kantner** (Milkweed, \$14.95 paper, 1571310479)

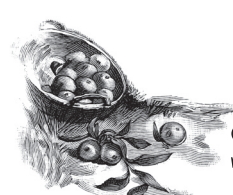
