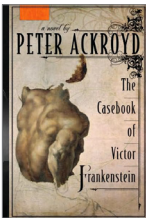
But Not for Long

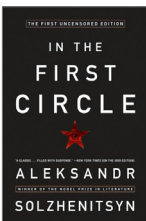

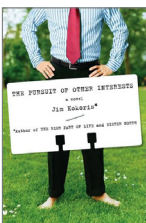
The First Uncensored Edition, by Aleksandr I. Solzhenitsyn

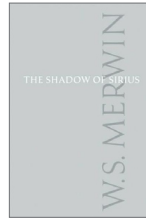

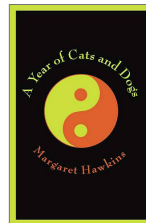
The Shadow of Sirius

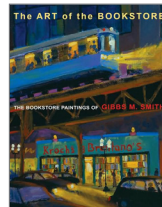
