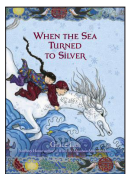

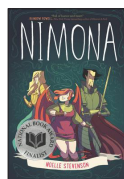

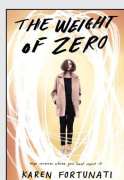

The Weight of Zero, by Karen Fortunati (Delacorte Press/Random House Children's Books, \$17.99) "After Catherine is diagnosed with bipolar disorder, she doesn't believe that she'll survive.
