Watercress, by Andrea Wang, Jason Chin (Illus.) (Neal Porter Books, \$18.99) "As her family drives along a road in rural Ohio, a girl's parents suddenly stop when they see watercress growing by the side of the road. She's embarrassed when she has to help collect it and refuses to eat it when it's prepared for dinner. This prompts a family discussion of her parents' childhoods in China that helps the girl gain appreciation for her parents and for the watercress.
